THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY

The life of the community, in days and years, is made up of a long string of events. Individual prayers, daily Masses, Baptisms, First Communions, Confirmations, Confessions, Weddings, and Funerals; drop-in visitors who sit quietly for a moment, a helping hand to someone in need: these are the small and large moments—ordinary, yet extraordinary—that, over time, make up the strong web of faith and history that form the actual Basilica.

Designed by Emmanuel Masqueray in the Beaux Arts style, construction of the church began in 1907. The exterior was completed in 1914; the interior completed in 1926—including the addition of the stained glass windows designed, constructed, and installed by Gaytee Stain Glass Co., a local business. Known as The Pro-Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception, the church was granted the title of The Basilica of Saint Mary by Pope Pius XI, February 1, 1926. It is the first Minor Basilica in the United States. The Basilica of Saint Mary was granted the title of Co-Cathedral in 1966.





ADVOCATE for Catholic principles and priorities in climate change discussion and decisions, especially as they impact those who are poor and vulnerable.



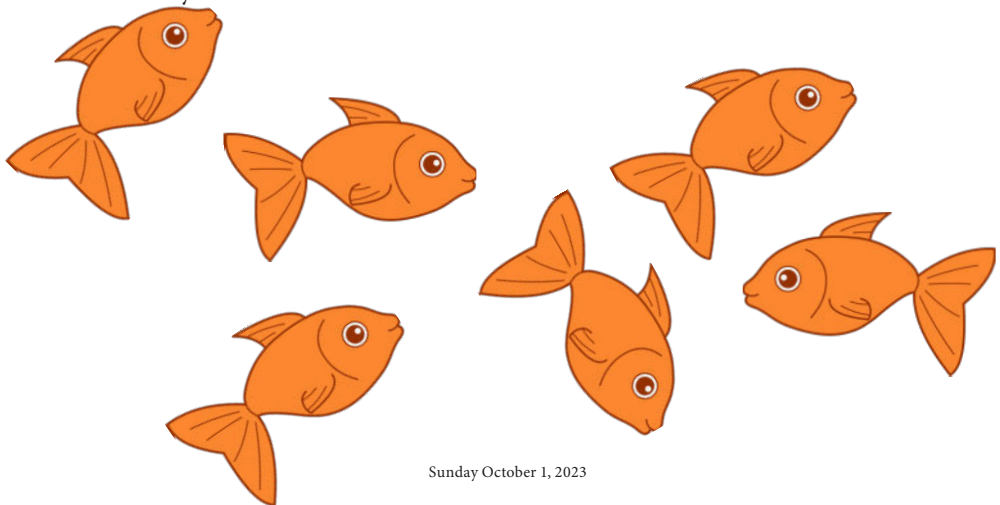
THE BASILICA OF SAINT MARY
